AoMRC Statement on the Omicron Variant

EMTA, along all the Royal College's trainee groups, work with the Academy of Medical Royal Colleges on cross-specialty issues. <u>This statement is brief and worth a read</u>. The statement includes what the AoMRC thinks is required to tackle the crisis and includes a link to the Academy report <u>"a dozen things the NHS could do tomorrow to help the medical workforce crisis.</u>" Why am I telling you this? In the emergency department we are in our own (particularly sharp) corner of this crisis, and it is really easy to get tunnel vision; I find having an awareness of the bigger picture helpful and this is particularly digestible.

Education Reform (not another one)

You may have heard the <u>news that Health Education England will merge back into</u> <u>NHS England</u>. For trainees in England this will certainly have an impact, however what this will be is difficult to predict. For trainees outside of England I can't promise you that this won't affect you either!

We have worked hard over the past few years to make sure that trainees are represented at the Statutory Educational Bodies and we will fight to maintain this representation as things get shuffled around.
